5. <u>RAY'S TALK</u>

- Website has all the details re what is available. Posted copies available
- Queensland Orchid Fair. Large orchid shopping centre. Growers from all over the country. Beenleigh 6- 8 March.
- 21st Open Day 4-5 July: Saturday speakers day. Entertaining and knowledgeable speakers from all over.
- Off to Thailand to investigate labs and "the culture".
- Spoke about the structure of the plants. Importance of the roots..."the mouth of the plant". Healthy roots = Healthy plant.
- Many orchids grow on rocks or trees roots open and airy with humidity.
- Need to be grown so they don't stay wet in the pot..... must be well drained.
- Pots must have a good drainage system, Iron bark or use tree fern bits.
- Potting mix must let water run through, have space for air and hold some moisture.
- Best media should last for at least 2 years to hold plant up.
- Orchids generally don't like to be in pots that are too big. They like to be cramped.
- Like to be under a tree or under shade. Need light in varying degrees. They need shade. Shade cloth is not as good as a tree as it doesn't absorb the heat. Try to mirror natural conditions.
- Experiment with locations for plants.
- Orchids need food, which goes in through a healthy root system. Doesn't really matter what fertilizer to use. N+= leaves N- higher phosphorous and potassium levels = flowers. Fertilizer for flowering and fruit will work for orchids. Look at the recommendation for dosage and halve it at least. Small amount of fertilizer regularly.

- Watering. Check the mix. If it feels damp leave it to dry a bit then give it a good soak and let it dry out again. Rainwater is fantastic for all plants don't worry about fertilizer during rain times.
- Questions and discussion.
- Ed's plant has fungus. Fungicide. BE CAREFUL. Can use soluble lime.
- Barb's cymbidium is terminal with a virus.
- Condy's crystals can be used as a potassium additive. Ron don't mix so much!!
- Air movement essential in our humid climate

11 ORCHID CULTURE

Here are a few notes from Alan Merriman, a Sydney Orchid dealer. These notes are aimed more at medium to advanced growers that to beginners.

Well I hope all of you managed to get around to cleaning up your orchid growing areas, pulled a few weeds etc. This month I have decided to put a few things together to get you back in the mood. Way back in 2008 I was doing some trials using some of the available controlled release fertilisers. After three years I found the BASACOTE +6m with a N-P- K of 16 + 3.5 + 9.9 + TE gave us tremendous results on cymbidiums , Cattleyas and other mixed genera. As I wrote in a previous newsletter it was applied at repotting and every six months. The trial ended in 2013, the trial material was donated by Garden City Plastics. This material is usually available from us at Miriam Ann Orchids. So those of you who missed the results here it is!



Nutrients: Over the last few years we have been inundated with a myriad of new fertilisers. These have come as organic, foliar, complete etc. The old saying used to be, it will make a dead stick grow roots! A word of warning! Before using any new fertiliser that you know nothing about, trial a few plants with the new fertiliser over a one to two year period, to check growth over flowering. You may use tomatoes for quicker results. Remember, there is now such thing as a magic fertiliser for use on orchids! Cymbidiums need around 2.0 - 25% nitrogen, Phalaenopsis around 1.5 -2.5%, Paphs 1.3-2.0% while Cattleyas need 1.3 - 1.7% of nitrogen. So you can see from these figures, orchids need around the same amount of nitrogen except cymbidiums! Potassium levels are nearly the same as the nitrogen levels. Phosphorus is a different matter. Usually around 8 - 12%. Calcium is critical for quality of blooms and strength of leaves and racemes. Cymbidium calcium levels are around 1.0%, Phalaenopsis 3.0 - 5.0%, Paphs 1.6%. These levels is what your plants require for good growth. Well how long do4es it take to be absorbed into the plant? Plants can obtain the essential nutrients they require from a wide range of sources such as organic such as rain and hidden nutrients in the potting media. Water and nutrients can be taken up by plant roots or leaves. However, nutrient uptake

through leaves will only ever supply a small amount of the plants total requirements. This is due t the leaves sensitivity to application of large concentrations of <u>foliar nutrients</u>. The risk of damage to plants is reduced when nutrients are applied in <u>smaller</u> concentration. Remember the nutrients that are applied to the plants leaves can only be absorbed through the stomata (under the leaves) and through microscopic openings in the cuticle. To ensure optimal uptake of nutrients, foliar fertilization should be carried out when relative humidity is high such as <u>early in the morning or late in the afternoon</u>. This is why many growers water their plants some hours before fertilising.

How long does it take for our plants to absorb the nutrients that you apply?

Nitrogen	-	1-6 hours
Phosphorus	-	1-5 days
Potassium	-	1 – 4 days
Manganese	-	1 – 2 days
Zinc	-	1 day
Magnesium	-	20% within the hour
Iron	-	8% within 24 hours

This is the time it takes for the plants to absorb 50%

Over this summer period here in NSW we have had periods of extreme hot weather and cold wet weather. Excellent for all sorts of fungi growth. If you are a cymbidium grower now is the time to check out the two spotted mite situation. Look for silvery markings under the leaves. If you do not have a very large collection you can spray with ECO – OIL mixed with you favourite acaracide or insecticide. ECO – NEEM[®] mixed with ECO-OIL[®] or MAVRIK[®]. During the summer a spray with a protective fungicide such as MANCOZEB[®]. Watch for root rot, if present drench with ANTI ROT[®]. During February I usually start t do my potting on. The plants have time to settle in before flowering
