9. END of YEAR DINNER

Earlier this year we asked members for their ideas about our Christmas function and we have decided to have a dinner at Mangrove Jacks at the Promenade in Harbour Drive.

We will hold our regular December awards meeting at 6 p.m. on Thursday 3rd December at Mangrove Jacks at the Promenade on Harbour Drive (Have you been there before? The site was the Coffs Harbour butter factory before it closed in the 1950s). We will have our annual awards and presentations with prize money for our monthly displays.

We will also have an orchid display and members are encouraged to bring along a plant – limit of one per member – and there will be a popular vote, but no judging.

At the end of this meeting those who are not staying for dinner may leave and then we will have dinner.

We will order dinner from Mangrove Jacks dinner menu, and the society will contribute \$10 towards the cost of each meal for members.

We will need people to sign up for the dinner to help with catering, and this can be done at the November meeting, or by contacting Bronwen or by e-mail. We have a few people who have signed up but we need more to make the evening a success.



10. MAX MacKAY'S TALK on SLIPPER ORCHIDS

Max has been growing orchids for a long time – his first slipper in 1963. His new orchid house has slippers at the south end under an 8' roof with two thicknesses of 70% shade cloth, plus milky plastic/solar wool on top. In the 1980s he had African Violets and although they were too much trouble he found they grew roots well into the sandy floor of his glasshouse. The orchids also loved it so he mixed sharp sand with bark in square pots. Sand from Wyora Gravel Pit near Missibotti. Others growers dismissed the use of sand but he persevered and continues to use a mix of 3 parts small grade bark, 2 parts sand and 1 part Perlite with excellent results. Uses coarser bark in the base of the pot to hold the mix in place.

He believes people lose slippers mainly because of over-watering. Once every 2-3 weeks early morning in winter (soil only). Increase water in spring/summer as temperatures increase (possibly every two days when really hot) but again early morning. Make sure you keep the flowers dry.

Osmocote is good for speedy feeding but uses Campbells – a very weak solution straight into the pot – once a month in spring and weekly in summer.



Starts his plants in 3" tubes – the smaller the better and the crown should always be under the mix. When repotting, retain as many roots as possible and you can freshen the old mix with handful of new sand but always try and keep the roots hanging loose, place in the pot and firm the mix around them – again with the crown covered. Remember to put the label back into the pot (preferably marked with a 4B or 6B pencil) !! If the mix is OK only need to repot every two years, but they do seem to like being repotted but preferably **no**t when in flower. Max prefers the taller, thinner pots for this style of plants and root formation.

Divide by pulling apart rather than cutting. Fungus can be a problem but the plants need to be kept cool.

11. A LITTLE BIT of HISTORY

One of the most prestigious nurseries of the 19th century was that of James Veitch & Sons, which was first established by James Veitch in Exeter (Devon) in 1832. Orchids were introduced into the business in 1840, when he sent William Lobb_to Brazil to collect plants, including orchids.

Veitch was the first nurseryman to send collectors abroad, rather than to commission agents in foreign ports to supply plants. He and other nurserymen soon found that it paid dividends to employ collectors who had some idea of the types of plants that were suitable for cultivation under European conditions.

William Lobb first collected in the Organ Mountains near Rio de Janeiro (Brazil) before moving on to Chile and Peru. He introduced four orchids to cultivation on this trip, the most well known being *Phragmipedium caudatum*. Three years later Veitch sent Thomas Lobb (William's brother) to Asia, where he collected in Java, India, Burma, Borneo and the Philippines. His most important introductions were *Vanda coerulea, Paphiopedilum villosum, P. javanicum, Aerides fieldingii, Bulbophyllum lobbii* and *Phalaenopsis amabilis*

In 1853 the nursery was moved to Chelsea, a suburb of London. At this time the head grower, John Dominy, was carrying out his pioneering experiments with man-made orchid hybrids. The first to flower, in 1856, was *Calanthe* Dominii, followed soon after by a cattleya. Dominy made about 25 hybrids before he retired but his successor, John Seden, subsequently made hundreds more hybrids before he, in turn, retired near the end of the century.

I wonder whether either Dominy or Seden ever imagined that a further 100,000 orchid hybrids would be made during the next hundred years!

Veitch & Sons continued to send collectors to all parts of the globe, as well as commissioning others to collect for them. Colonel Benson sent them many orchids from Burma, among them *Dendrobium bensonii*. James grandson, John Gould Veitch, collected *Dendrobium gouldii*, *D. canaliculatum and D. johannis*, *Paphiopedilum philippinensis and Cymbidium canaliculatum* during an extended trip to "the South Seas", which included Australia!

Other collectors for Veitch included Henry Hutton, Carl Kramer and Gottlieb Zahn, who drowned in Costa Rica.

One of Veitch's most successful collectors in the period 1870-1878 was J.H. Chesterton, valet to a gentleman who travelled extensively in foreign countries. Chesterton had the idea of bringing some orchids back to England and wrote to Veitch for advice on how best to pack orchids for travel. When Chesterton eventually returned from abroad, he brought with him a batch of beautifully packed orchids in perfect condition, perhaps because of

experience gained from continually packing his master's clothes! Veitch was so impressed that he sent Chesterton to find and collect *Miltoniopsis vexillaria* from Colombia. Others had collected plants of this species previously but none of the plants had ever reached England alive. Chesterton succeeded, and created considerable demand for future shipments of this highly desirable species. He also found and sent home shipments of *Masdevallia coccinea* var. *Harryana, Odontoglossum crispum* (now *Oncidium alexandrae*) and (presumably) *Dracula chestertonii*.

George Downton, A.R. Endres, Gustave Wallis, Peter Veitch, Guillermo Kalbreyer and David Burke were other Veitch collectors. The orchids collected by Curtis included *Paphiopedilum curtisii* (now *P. superbiens*), *P. tonsum and Coelogyne dayana*.

Sir Harry Veitch retired in 1913 and sold his business to Messrs. Black and Flory. However his nursery will never be forgotten because of its legacy in the form of Veitch's *Manual of Orchidaceous Plants*, originally published in ten parts between 1894 and 1897, and subsequently issued in two bound volumes. It still remains the definitive work on orchid species discovered and imported into Britain during the 19th century.
